Thankful. We have broken ground on the new Chili Community Center. Sometimes The Future Is The Past 745 Ballantyne Road-Chili's Latest Landmark Home

Standing on the porch of the tidy stout farmhouse on the morning of the season's first snowfall is always special-the air crisper, cleaner somehow, the sunlight brighter and more welcome, the view of the pastures, the cattle, and even the clucking of the hens a little more revitalizing.

The view alone, atop the hill at 745 Ballantyne Road leaves no doubt as to why, in 1830, David Smith chose the site to build his cobblestone home and why, in 2015, Mary and John Kinton chose to rehabilitate the house and re-purpose its 160 acres.

When Smith broke ground for the family's four-square cobblestone home Ballantyne Road was no more than a footpath. While the home was being built the Smiths lived in the basement, protected by its substantial rubble-stone walls (sometimes referred to as rag work) that were up to two feet thick. Generally shallow, the basement is 6 feet high with concrete floors and a cistern at floor level. The side hill construction allows a walk out exit.

Originally the home featured a center entrance, two rooms on the lower level with a center stairway to its upper level. Additionally, it contained a fireplace with chimneys on both ends of the structure. Its sturdy beams are log and bark and exhibit straight line kerfs on most of the floor joists and beams, their mortice and tenon joints reinforced with wood pegs. The first floor features a large living room, lathe and plaster walls, and an original Lord Rumford fireplace. While most of the trim and molding is original, John did custom cut additional replacement trim with special bits. There are two front door entrances; in keeping with the tradition of in-home wakes the larger of the two was used for funeral services.

Around 1850 the house was enlarged to incorporate a dining room and kitchen; in particular, the woodshed and cistern became the new kitchen and bath-welcome additions to a home that, at times, housed mom, dad, and eleven children. The second floor accommodated three bedrooms and was accessed via a pioneer staircase-steep by modern standards. Finally, in 1890, a frame addition was added that defines the present footprint.

Mary and John purchased the property at public auction in 2015. To say it needed serious

rehabbing would be an understatement. The Kintons are to be commended on the toil and hard work that brought this house to its outstanding presentation in just four years. As they stated, the bones were there but virtually everything-from electric to plumbing to roofing-needed updating. Additionally, the flooring, walls, ceilings, and trim required attention. And, of course, the task wasn't complete without major renovations to kitchen, bath, laundry room and attached porch.

When the Historic Preservation Board considers a property for landmark status, we strive to discover what makes it special-to us but, more importantly, to the owners. What makes this property distinctive is the fact that the Kintons are utilizing-living-the land in much the same way that David Smith did 190 years ago. They raise livestock (registered Black Angus), chickens and turkeys; from a small re-purposed shed (now "country store") they sell brown eggs, pork, Angus beef, local honey and maple syrup. These activities require they maintain their residence and the additional barns, outbuildings and, of course, the land itself. John would probably agree that a herd of cattle requires sturdy fences, good gates, fresh water and ample hay-tons of hay. It is one thing to inhabit an historic building, another, entirely, to embrace an historic way of life within a contemporary lifestyle.

To their credit, the Kintons possess a deep appreciation for their property and the significance, in 2019, of preserving the promise of the property. They welcome learning opportunities, host educational groups, and understand their part in the farm-to-table initiative. What also stands out is their commitment to stewardship, good neighbor relations, and, especially, their acknowledgment that their way of life, their choices are challenges-welcome challenges that they embrace, challenges they chose.

Their biggest payback: The Kintons love what they're doing; they believe they're blessed to live the lifestyle they chose, a lifestyle that embraces the land now and as it did in 1830.

Questions and Answers for homeowners about the STAR Credit program -Important information for STAR exemption recipients

If your income is greater than \$250,000 and less than or equal to \$500,000

- If you currently receive the Basic STAR exemption and your income is between \$250,000 and \$500,000, the program is changing for you. If eligible, you will now receive a check for the STAR credit instead of the reduction on your school tax bill.
- If you receive a letter asking you to update your STAR registration (Form RP-425-RDM)

If your income is \$250,000 or less

• If you currently receive the STAR exemption, you can choose to register for the STAR credit to receive a check instead; you may receive a greater benefit.

Q: If I'm receiving the STAR exemption, should I switch to receiving a check for the STAR credit?

A: Yes, see Assessor STAR Note at end of article. Beginning in 2019, homeowners who have the STAR exemption may receive a greater benefit if they switch to the STAR credit. The value of the STAR credit savings may grow by as much as 2% from year to year, but the value of the STAR exemption savings cannot increase.

In addition, if your income is \$250,000 or higher, you must switch to the STAR credit to continue receiving the STAR benefit.

To switch to the STAR credit:

- 1. Notify your assessor to withdraw from the STAR exemption.
 - 2. Register for the STAR credit.

Q: After I buy a new home, when do I become eligible for the STAR credit?

A: You will become eligible for the STAR credit in the first year that you own the home and it is your primary residence as of the date that school taxes are due.

Example 1: If the school taxes in your community are due by September 30, and you purchase the home on September 15, you will become eligible for STAR that year, as long as you register for the STAR credit and meet the eligibility criteria.

Exception: If the prior owner had been

receiving a STAR exemption on the home, and the sale occurred after the local "taxable status date" (generally March 1st), his or her STAR exemption will be carried over to your first school tax bill, and you will begin receiving the STAR credit the following year.

Example 2: If the school taxes in your community are due by September 30, and you purchase the home on October 15 (after school taxes are due), you will become eligible for the STAR credit the following year, as long as you register and meet the eligibility criteria.

Q: I own my single-family home and have been residing in it for over a decade, but I never applied for the Basic STAR exemption. Am I eligible for the Basic STAR exemption now, or do I have to register for the STAR credit with the Tax Department?

A: Since you weren't receiving the STAR exemption on the property in 2015, you're not eligible to receive the exemption. You should register with the Tax Department for the credit.

Q: I used to receive the STAR exemption on my school tax bill, but I bought a new home. Why do I have to get a STAR credit check instead of the exemption?

A: In 2016, the law changed regarding the STAR exemption. Instead of applying to your assessor for the exemption, you'll now register with New York State for the STAR credit. If you are eligible, you will receive a STAR credit in the form of a check. The dollar value of the credit will generally be the same as the property tax exemption.

Q: How do I register for the STAR credit?

A: You can register online or by phone; visit Register for the STAR credit or call 518-457-2036. Before you start an online application or call, gather all the information required to register, because you won't be able to save the registration to complete at a later time.

Q: When should I register?

A: We recommend you register as soon as possible after you move into your home. Registrations will be accepted for three years from the income tax filing deadline for the year that the credit covers. For example, to claim the STAR credit for 2017, you must register by April 15, 2021. However, the sooner you register, the sooner you will receive your STAR check. Bear in mind that the STAR credit began in 2016. You cannot request a STAR credit for 2015 or prior years.

Q: Do I need to register every year?

A: No. Once you've registered, we'll automatically review your eligibility for the credit every year after that for as long as you continue to own and occupy your home.

Q: I already registered for the STAR credit, since then I have bought and moved to a new home. Do I need to register again?

A: Yes, if you switch residences you must re-register for the STAR credit in order to receive the benefit on your new home.

Q: I purchased my home in 2018 after the 2018 STAR application deadline, but I received the STAR exemption on my 2018–19 school tax bill. Do I need to register?

A: Yes. The reason you received the STAR exemption on your 2018–19 school tax bill is because the previous owner of your home was granted the STAR exemption. You were entitled to their benefit for the remainder of the 2018-19 school year, but you are not entitled to keep their STAR exemption beyond that. You must register for the STAR credit in order to receive a STAR benefit in the future.

Q: I recently bought my mobile home and live in a mobile home park. Am I eligible for the STAR credit?

A: Mobile home owners are eligible for the STAR credit as long as they meet all the STAR eligibility criteria.

Q: As a mobile home owner, is there an advantage for me to have the STAR Credit instead of the STAR exemption?

A: In some cases, yes. First, you must understand the difference between how each is administered. The exemption is a reduction applied directly to a property's school tax bill. In the case of mobile home parks, the park owner receives the school tax bill and divides the debt among all the tenants proportionately according to the taxable assessed value of their mobile home. The tenant then pays their share of the school tax as a portion of their lot rent. For the credit, the Tax Department applies an assessed value of \$20,000 to all mobile homes unless the assessor reports a greater assessed value to the Tax Department. Therefore, unless your mobile home is assessed greater than \$20,000, then the credit may provide a greater savings than the exemption.

Q: I own a mobile home in a mobile home park and receive the STAR exemption. Will my STAR savings be larger if I register for the credit?

A: You may receive a larger savings with the credit instead of the exemption if the mobile home is not separately assessed and its equalized assessed value is less than \$20,000. You would be separately assessed if you have any other exemptions in addition to the STAR; for example, a veterans exemption, a senior exemption, a disabled exemption, etc. The difference is because for the exemption, the savings is calculated based on the assessed value of the mobile home unit. The park owner receives the school tax bill and distributes the STAR savings to the unit owners, often by reducing their lot rent. In addition, the owner can keep two percent of the savings for record-keeping purposes.

However, by law, the STAR credit for a mobile home unit that is not separately assessed is based on a minimum equalized assessed value of \$20,000, and the credit is issued as a check directly to the unit owner—not the park owner. In addition, the park owner is not involved with the administration of the STAR credit so the

two percent reduction allowed for record-keeping purposes to administer the exemption is not applicable.

Q: I didn't receive my STAR credit check in time to pay my school tax bill. Is my credit check now eligible for interest?

A: State law allows for interest to be paid on STAR credits only if you registered on or before July 1. However, even if you registered on or before July 1, your eligibility for interest depends on when your school district's tax roll was filed with the Tax Department. Specifically, if the school tax roll was filed with us:

- by July 1, you're eligible for interest if the check isn't issued by July 31.
- by September 1, you're eligible for interest if the check isn't issued by September 30.
- after September 1, you're eligible for interest if the check isn't issued within 30 days from the filing of the roll.

Note: Checks for cooperatives and mobile homes may be on a different schedule. If you are entitled to interest, it will be automatically added to your check when it is issued.

Q: I have been receiving a Basic STAR exemption since 2014. I turned 65 years old a few months ago and believe that I now qualify for the Enhanced STAR exemption. Do I apply to the assessor to receive the Enhanced STAR exemption?

A: Yes. If you have been receiving STAR since before the 2015 STAR application deadline, the STAR rules are the same for you as before

To have your Basic STAR upgraded to Enhanced STAR, you must submit the following to your assessor:

- <u>RP-425-IVP</u>, <u>Supplement to Form RP-425-E</u> (include the Social Security numbers of all owners of the property and any of their spouses who reside at the property), and
 - RP-425-E, Application for Enhanced STAR Exemption.

Q: I've been getting the Enhanced STAR exemption on my home for several years. What do I need to do now?

A: If you are already enrolled in the Income Verification Program (IVP), you do not need to do anything. However, if you are not enrolled in IVP, you must submit <u>RP-425-IVP</u>, <u>Supplement to Form RP-425-E</u> (include the Social Security numbers of all owners of the property and any of their spouses who reside at the property).

Q: I have continuously owned my home and have been receiving the STAR exemption, but a co-owner has been added or removed as a result of marriage, divorce, or the death of a spouse. Do I have to switch to the STAR credit?

A: No. If you received the STAR exemption in 2015 and you continue to own the home, you're eligible to continue receiving the exemption.

Q: I'm receiving the Enhanced STAR exemption and I'm considering placing my home in a trust or life estate. Will I lose the STAR exemption and have to register for the STAR credit?

A: No. As long as you continue to live in the home and you're either the trust beneficiary or life tenant, you're eligible to continue receiving the exemption.

Assessor STAR Note:

The question many homeowners have asked, who are grandfathered-in the exemption process, is "to switch, or not to switch" to the STAR Credit Check. This office cannot direct your decision to either way; the choice ultimately comes down to the personal preference of the property owner. The Assessor and staff may only assist in administering at the direction of the property owner on which is their preference. Mobile home owners are encouraged to contact this office with their STAR questions. Discussion and questions may be made directly to the Assessor at any time.

Are you turning 65 in 2020? Or possibly you've already turned 65? Would you like to see if you could save more on your school taxes?

First things first...Happy Birthday! If you are already receiving a Basic STAR exemption and will be turning 65 in the calendar year 2020; that means your birthday occurs on a day between January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020; then you may be eligible to receive additional savings on your school tax bill!

To do this, you must apply for the Enhanced STAR exemption by MARCH 1, 2020 (taxable status date) even if your birthdate is after this date in 2020. Submit a completed, signed, form RP-425-E and RP-425-IVP along with proof of age (driver's license, etc.) and your 2018-income information to the Assessment Office, located at Town Hall. We do make courtesy copies, if you're not sure you have the correct income documents, just bring everything.

It is important to note, that if you have previously <u>registered</u> for a <u>STAR Credit Check</u>, with New York State (NYS), Department of Taxation & Finance (DTF), either by calling NYS DTF or going online to register (because you were a new homeowner, on or after March 2, 2015), <u>you do not need to apply again</u>.

NYS DTF will determine your added eligibility based on your registration information for age (they know your birthdate) and income eligibility (based on filed NYS tax return). We do recommend that anyone with questions should give our office a call (or stop in), as we would be happy to assist you in determining what action to take (or not).

The winter season is upon us again and with the cold weather setting in, the homeowner's focus is staying warm and comfortable. Alternate means of providing supplemental heat such as, the installation of a gas stove or fireplace, gas fireplace inserts (a gas insert that goes into an existing masonry fireplace), wood stove or pellet stoves.

Please be advised that a building permit is required for all of these types of heating devices prior to installation. The building permit process ensures the safe, proper installations of all of the above, that the installation contractor has the appropriate insurance required to do this work and that work complies with all applicable state and local codes.

IS A BUILDING PERMIT REQUIRED?

Building Permits are required for most projects, including:

- Pools Above ground & in-ground
- Hot tubs
- Sheds over 119 sq. ft.
- Decks Attached & free standing
- Whole house generators
- Finishing a basement
- Adding a bathroom
- Additions
- Demolishing an existing structure

There are setback requirements regardless of whether a building permit is required.

- Building Permits for additions, decks, sheds, etc. are valid for 18 months from issue date.
- Pool and Hot Tub permits are valid for 3 months from date of issue;
- All building permits are subject to renewal fees if work is not completed within the allotted period.
- No structure/pool is to be used until a Certificate of Compliance/Occupancy is issued.

WE ENCOURAGE ALL RESIDENTS TO CONTACT THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT AT (585) 889-6143, IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS REGARDING POTENTIAL PROJECTS, TO VERIFY THE ISSUANCE OF A CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY/COMPLIANCE OR CODE ENFORCEMENT.

WITH REGARD TO TRANSFER OF TITLES:

It is the responsibility of the property owner (seller or buyer) to ensure that all additions, accessory structures, pools, etc., are compliant with all codes, laws and regulations. All violations become the responsibility of subsequent owners.

The Town recommends that you obtain a copy of the building permit from your contractor to verify issuance of a permit. Furthermore, request proof of a Certificate of Occupancy/ Compliance from your contractor for any permitted work prior to the final payment to the contractor. This will insure that the completed installation complies with all local and state building codes and the Town has closed out the project. Regardless of who applied, procured or paid for the permit the ultimate responsibility of the project close out is the property owners.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE COMPLAINTS

- 1. One of our most common complaints is that of the condition of a neighboring property. While we understand, residents prefer to remain anonymous, doing so prevents code enforcement from properly following through with the complaint. Often times these complaints lead to legal action where the complainant will be called upon to testify.
- 2. The Town cannot accept nor respond to anonymous complaints. Complaints must be in writing, signed by the complainant and submitted to the Building Department. In the case of legal enforcement, testimony by the complainant may be required.
- 3. The Town can only cite violations visible from the public realm. Absent the separate legal authority, the Town does not enter private property. Alleged violations seen from neighboring properties are possible with the written consent of the neighboring property owner.
- 4. Once a violation has been assessed/confirmed, a Code Enforcement official will contact the property owner either in-person or in writing by issuing an Order to Remedy. Either of these methods will inform the property owner of the violation and prescribe a time for compliance. If compliance is, still not achieved legal enforcement can commence.

LICENSING

The Town of Chili, in accordance with New York State Agricultural Markets Laws require that all dogs four months of age and older be licensed in the municipality that they reside in. This can be done at the Town of Chili Town Clerks Office located at 3333 Chili Avenue. In order to obtain a dog license you will need:

- An updated proof of rabies vaccination from your veterinarian
- Proof of spay and neutering from your veterinarian
- Cost of licensing is \$10 dollars for spayed/ neutered dogs and \$20 for un-spayed/ un-neutered dogs.



WINTER HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS

Harsh winter weather brings a wide variety of concerns to our fuzzy companions. Bitter cold, biting winds numbing wetness and salt can cause much discomfort for our special canines. To assure your fuzzy companion stays healthy and safe through our long harsh winter months here are some helpful guidelines:

- Wind chill causes colder conditions than what a thermometer reads. Dog's shouldn't be left outside for extended periods of times. Even a half hour in frigid conditions can cause problems with your furry companion.
- All dogs left outside must have adequate shelter appropriate to their breed, physical conditions and climate. This is the law.
- Trimming excess hair from footpads and toes can help with ice buildup on their furry paws.
- A coat can also keep our furry friends cozy and warm.
- Never leave dogs alone in a car unattended in frigid temperatures. Dogs like humans can die from hypothermia. If the motor vehicle is left running your dog may be overcome by carbon monoxide.
- Anti freeze is very toxic to dogs as well as animals. Please take extra precaution if there is a spill to clean it up. Antifreeze tastes and smells good to dogs.
- Like humans, sometimes our pets don't feel well. Before giving your dog and over the counter medication check with your veterinarian to see if it is safe for your pet to ingest.



DON'T BE LOST WHEN YOUR PET IS

- Call your Towns Animal or Dog Control Office (Town of Chili-889-6175)
- Call surrounding local Animal Hospitals, frequently people will take a lost dog to a veterinarian to be scanned for a microchip.
- Look Inside sheds, garages and storage spaces in case the dog has inadvertently been trapped.
- Social Media has played a huge part in getting our lost pets home, for instance the Nextdoor app, Facebook,Lollypop Spotters and Craiglist just to mention a few.

Some of the Best ways to quickly find Your pet is to be prepared before hand:

- Microchip your pet and keep the microchip currently registered.
- Keep license tags or a tag with your information on your pet's collar.

These simple tips will help in returning your pet quicker to you and lessen the anxiety that goes along with losing them.

IF YOU FIND A LOST DOG:

Animal lovers sometimes find themselves coming across a stray or lost dog. Some helpful tips to reunite the stray with their owners:

- Call your local Dog/Animal Control Office this is one of the best ways to reconnect the dog with their owner.
- Check for tags on the dogs collar. If there is a license tag on the dog you can call your local shelter or Town Clerk to see who the owner is for that license tag.
 - Have the dog scanned for a microchip at your local veterinarian.
- Call 911, they will contact the on duty Dog Control Officer for that town and they will make sure the dog is safely picked up.


On behalf of all lost dogs and the families that are missing them, thank you to everyone who goes out of their way to make sure we reunite these pets back with their owners.

AS A REMINDER TO ALL TOWN OF CHILI RESIDENTS

- There is a leash law in affect in the Town of Chili. While dogs are off their property all dogs are to be secured by a physical leash no longer than six feet in length and under the owners control. This assures everyones safety as well as control over your pet.
- This does include all Town of Chili Public parks and while on public rights-of ways.
- Please be considerate and clean up after your pet while on walks and outings.

2020 Town and County Tax Payment information

If your taxes are not held in escrow, you should receive your Town and County tax bill by January 10. If you have not received it, you may view a copy on Monroe County's website (instructions below), or contact our office (889-6129) to obtain a copy. We receive all payments at the Tax Receiver Office, 3333 Chili Ave., Rochester, NY 14624, until May 31. We are open Monday through Friday 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Checks are made payable to Virginia Ignatowski, Receiver. Please carefully read the instructions contained on the bill. We accept cash, checks, and debit/credit cards. Visa Debit cards incur a flat fee of \$3.95 from our third party processor. Credit cards incur a 2.45% charge. As a reminder, a night deposit box is also available to enable payment dropoff after hours and on weekends. You may also pay on-line at the Town of Chili's website, www. townofchili.org. The payment portal is on the homepage.

In an effort to control costs, we only mail tax receipts to property owners in escrow or to those that request a receipt by checking the receipt requested box on the payment stub. We ask, however, that you consider obtaining your paid tax receipt by visiting the Monroe County website.

HOW TO GET A COPY OF YOUR BILL AND RECEIPT

- Go to www.monroecounty.gov.
- Look for a box on the upper right hand side of the county's home page titled "Top On-line Services". Click on the first bullet "View / Pay Taxes Online".
- This opens the Real Property Portal. Read the agreement and click "I Agree".
- On the next screen enter your address or the parcel ID number, and then click the "Search" button.
- Your property information should then appear. At the top right of the screen click on the green button that says "Pay Property Taxes". While you are not paying your tax, this is how to see all of your tax information.
- At the very top left of the next screen that opens you will see "School Tax Bill", "Combined Town and County Tax Bill", "Current School Transaction Summary" and "Combined Town and County Transaction Summary". The first

two are the original bills and the next two are the receipts for the most recent billing cycles. The payment information is at the bottom of the receipt. It will show the dates and amounts that received to date and an outstanding amount due if there is one.

• The Payment History button will show payments from previous years.

Of course, we understand that not everyone has a computer to retrieve information online. If requested, we will still mail the receipt to you. Just be sure to indicate this desire by checking the box on the bill and mailing the entire bill to us with your payment.

Would you like to receive an e-mail to alert you when we send out tax bills?

Sign up for e-mail notification! Check the Town Newsletters box on the home page of the town website. It is at the bottom left hand part of the screen labeled "Subscribe to Town News". Those that sign up for this service will receive announcements when bills are mailed that will also contain other helpful information from the tax office.

Installment and Partial Payments Can Be Confusing!

If you pay an installment outside of the printed time-frame on the stub, the amount due will be different! Many people will combine payment on several installments together, but don't adjust the interest accordingly. Anything paid prior to February 10th does not incur interest. Anything paid from February 11 through February 29th will have 1.5% interest applied. PLEASE NOTE that this is a leap year and February 29 lands on a Saturday this year. This means that due date is extended to the next business day, which will be March 2nd. Any time a due date lands on a day that we are not open; it is extended to the next business day. Anything in March has 3% applied, and in April; 4.5%. Please do not hesitate to call us if you are unsure how much you should pay.

On-line banking payments not recommended

On-line bank payments are highly discouraged and are done *at your own risk* as stated on the back of the bill. While this type of banking is an option many employ to pay their household bills, it is not recommended for time sensitive payments. Banks can take several days to send the check after the on-line request is made and *they do not contain a post office postmark date*. Subsequently, even though you may request a check payment on or before a due date, if it does not actually *arrive* by the due date, it is late. If you wish to pay via this method, we recommend that you do so with enough advance time to ensure that we receive it by the due date.

Check your bank accounts

If you mail payment to us, please check your bank account after a couple of weeks to ensure that your check cleared. We have had several instances of checks never arriving, and presumably, were lost in the mail. Homeowners were then surprised to find that they were now late / delinquent in their tax payments and owed interest and penalty fees. In addition, if you are in an escrow account, you should receive a receipt by the end of February. If not, please contact us. Banks can, and do, make mistakes. Both of these situations don't occur often, but when it does, it is far better to catch it early in the process.

New York's Third Party Notification Service for Real Property Taxes

Under New York law, owner- occupants of 1, 2, or 3 family residential real property who are at least 65 years of age or are disabled (by physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more of their major life activities) may designate an adult third party to receive duplicate copies of real property tax bills and notices of unpaid taxes. The intent of the law is to eliminate unfortunate situations where these taxpayers might otherwise lose their homes for nonpayment of taxes.

An application is available in the Chili Tax Office or you may also request an application by mail by sending a self-addressed envelope with your request to Virginia Ignatowski, Tax Receiver, 3333 Chili Ave., Rochester, NY 14624. The application must be completed and signed by the owner and the third party designee. Once the application is approved and filed, a duplicate of subsequent tax bills will be mailed to the third party until the Tax Receiver is notified by the applicant or a change appears on the tax roll or the assessor is notified of a change of owner.

Accessible (Handicap) Permits

Permits are issued by local governments and are available for any person living in the town, but you must apply to the town in which you live. Temporary or permanent permits are issued free to applicants.

Bring the following to the Town Clerk's Office:

- A completed Application for Parking Permits for Persons with Severe Disabilities. Part 1 is filled out by the applicant. Part 2 is completed and signed by the physician.
 - Driver's license or non-driver identification of the applicant.

Conditions for using parking permits:

- The permit may be used to park in reserved handicapped parking spaces only when the person with the disability is driving or riding in the vehicle. Other people cannot use the parking permit!
- Hang parking permits from the rear-view mirror when parked, but remove them from the mirror when driving.
- The permit can be transferred to whatever vehicle the disabled person is riding in or driving.

Lost or stolen permits:

Visit the Town Clerk's office to replace a lost or stolen permit. You will need to sign an affidavit attesting to it being lost or stolen. A new permit will be issued for the remainder of the term of the original permit.

Can I pick up a permit on behalf of another person?

It is best if the individual is present, but you may pick up a permit for someone else. In addition to the application form and the disabled person's identification, you will need to supply your own identification and fill out an affidavit attesting that the person currently lives in the town.

What should I do with a handicap permit of a person that is no longer living?

Please inform the Town Clerk's office when a handicap permitted individual has passed away. You may either destroy the permit, or return it to the Clerk's office. Please note that it is illegal for another person to use the permit!

What should I do if I move?

You will need to obtain a permit from your new town. You may either pick up your paperwork at our office prior to moving, or we can fax the original paperwork over to your new municipal clerk's office.

Highway/Public Works

Wood Chips and Leaf Mulch

Wood chips and leaf mulch are available for re-use. Stockpiles are located at the Highway Department, 200 Beaver Road on the right side of the driveway entrance.

Christmas Tree Collection

The Town of Chili offers free Christmas tree disposal and will be collected on the same schedule as the Debris Pick-up Program. If you prefer, you can drop off your Christmas tree at the Highway Department, 200 Beaver Road. Just follow the signs.

Mailboxes

The Highway Department asks that residents keep their mailboxes in good condition throughout the year. Mailboxes that are neglected will surely be affected by our plows due to the heavy snow from our wing plows. Our drivers take extra measures to avoid mailboxes, but sometimes weather conditions restrict the driver's ability to avoid them. If your mailbox is damaged during snow removal, a post/stake and a standard size metal mailbox are the only replacements, regardless of what you had previously installed. The highway crew will repair any mailbox they damage, to serviceable condition, not necessarily a new mailbox.

DEBRIS PICK-UP PROGRAM

Town Pick-up Schedule

In general, the Town picks up brush and tree limbs on the schedule below. However, during times of increased service demand such as spring pickup season or after a severe storm, there will be delays which will impact the pickup schedule. For the latest information on the status of the pickup schedule, please contact the dispatch line at (585) 889-2630, prompt #2.

First & Third Full Week – (Starting on a Monday) North & West Chili - north from Chili Avenue and west from Chili-Coldwater Road. .

Second & Fourth Full Week – East from Chili-Coldwater Road and south from Chili Avenue.

- Brush and tree limbs must be cut and stacked neatly with the cut ends facing the road. Please stack brush, logs, and shrubs separately. Limbs should be left as long as possible. Logs must be cut as short as possible. All material, except log pieces, will be chipped. Material not chipped will be collected by another vehicle, possibly the next day. Chips are available for reuse at the Highway garage storage area and by delivery to the home upon request. Leaf mulch is also available for reuse.
- **Green waste**, vines, weeds, sticks, and shrubs shall be piled separately for packer pick-up. <u>PLEASE DO NOT BAG.</u> WE WILL NOT PICK UP BAGS AND WE DO NOT PICK UP GRASS CLIPPINGS. Backyard composting is suggested.
- Metal items and white goods, EXCLUDING dehumidifiers, air conditioners, refrigerators, and freezers (unless Freon has been removed & Red Tagged). Please call your private hauler for details regarding those items.
- Rocks, concrete, brick, and dirt. Must be piled separately and not in pieces larger than 12". PLEASE DO NOT BAG.
- Junk cars. By appointment, and proof of ownership is required.

All inquiries should be directed to the Department of Public Works Office at 889-2630, Monday – Friday between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. NOTE: May through September, hours are Monday – Thursday 6:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Friday 6:00 a.m. – 10:00 a.m.

- No Tires must be off rims to be collected by your private hauler
- Do not place items in concrete gutters, ditches, or on top of storm drains
- Pile materials separately from items to be collected by your private hauler
- No contractor-generated tree debris
- Unreasonably large amounts of debris shall not be placed at the curbside without prior approval of the *DPW*. Please contact 889-6156 for help in this matter.
- No construction debris or building materials
- No furniture, TVs, fuel tanks
- Residents having items which are considered hazardous waste material should call Monroe County Hazardous Waste at 753-7600 for information on disposal.





This is a two acre park located on Ballantyne Road, next to the Arc of Monroe County. Park amenities include a playing field and playground.

This 28-acre recreational area is located at 400 Chili-Scottsville Road. The property is home to an 18 hole disc-golf course, a picnic pavilion available for rent, beautiful landscapes and a trail perfect for exploring the park.

Access to the park and lodge is off Union Street in North Chili at the end of Rock Island Road. Recreation facilities surrounding a lodge, playground equipment, a new sprayground, a nature trail, access to Black Creek, 2 athletic fields, a basketball court and a paved trail perfect for walking and biking.

YOLANDA PARK

Yolanda Park, a 3.7 acre park, is located on Yolanda Drive and consists of a soccer field and playground equipment.

AARP TAX ASSISTANCE:

Once again this service will be offered free of charge for our seniors age 60 and over. Appointments will start in January and can be made by calling the Town Hall at 889-3550. Please do not call the Senior Center. Thank you for your cooperation.

ELDERSOURCE SERVICES:

We have a representative from Lifespan here at the Center once a month, generally on a Monday from 10:00 am-12:00 pm. If you need help with a medical, financial, or legal issue and do not know where to turn, stop in. If you are concerned about a family member, a health issue, or housing, please come and talk with our

representative. Appointments are not required. Please call the Senior Center to verify dates.



TRAC:

If you are struggling with transportation issues and need some direction, please consider calling TRAC. This program offers an easy, safe, and quick answer to some of your transportation needs. This program is sponsored by Eldersource and partially funded by the New Freedom Funds and United Way of Rochester. Call 325-2800 for more information. TRAC arranges the most appropriate transportation solution, using the full range of transportation options. TRAC is not a transportation provider, but will help put you in touch with providers that meet your needs.

HOME DELIVERED MEALS:

The Monroe County Office for the Aging contracts with Visiting Nurse Service of Rochester and Monroe County, Inc. (585-787-8313) to assist with better health through nutrition. Often mealtime becomes a real challenge for individuals who are recuperating from an illness or who are too ill or frail to prepare a meal. Meals on Wheels is a service that provides the valuable nutrition needed. To be eligible for this service a person must be:

- 60 years of age;
- Homebound;
- Living alone or with someone who is unable to prepare nutritious meals and/or is absent during the day.

Visiting Nurse Service has numerous meal programs. The meals, which are funded by the Office for the Aging, have a suggested donation of \$3.00 per meal.

CHILI LIONS MEDICAL LOAN CLOSET:

Do you need to borrow some medical equipment? Feel free to contact the Loan Closet. They will do their best to help you out. To contact the Loan Closet for medical needs, or to make a donation, please call (585) 594-0839.

BOOKS TO PEOPLE PROGRAM:

Are you or someone you love unable to come to the library in person due to health reasons? If so, the Chili Public Library's "Books to People Program" is for you. This program is made possible by the Friends of Chili Public Library and is available to residents of Chili who are restricted from driving for health reasons.

"Books to People" provides free delivery of library materials to your home on a regular basis. A librarian will select materials for you based on the interests you indicate on your application. A volunteer member of the Friends will make deliveries to your home and pick up materials for return to the library. To register for this program, please fill out the application, which can be obtained at the library or on the library's website, www.chililibrary.org, under Friends/ Services. If you have any questions, please contact the librarian at the Information Desk or Friend's Board Liaison Marcia Johnson at 889-2200.

STAR PROGRAM:

STAR (Support to Aged Residents) is a unique program in Monroe County. It is the only program that offers individualized services to frail, elderly persons over 60 years of age, either by a donation-based or small fee for the service program. We need your help! Volunteers are needed to do simple things that many of our elderly neighbors cannot do for themselves. It just takes an hour or two of your time each month to brighten a life. For more information, please call 262-7057.

Services may include transportation, grocery shopping, banking, or prescription pick-up. Occasional needs might be something as simple as friendly visiting, telephone reassurance, yard work, and chores.

FOOD CUPBOARDS:

There are many sources of food in the Chili area for your needs. If you are running a bit low and need some assistance, please feel free to contact one. entire 15-year period.

- The Chili Ambulance from 2006 thru 2008


Training Tower updates provide critical refresh to CFD facilities

Have you ever wondered what all the buildings are behind our Company #1 in Chili Center?


The CFD is fortunate enough to have three separate structures with which we conduct training in located right on our property; a three-story live fire training building, a roof ventilation simulator, and a mask confidence/basement simulator. While these three structures are not physically connected, they play a critical role in ensuring your CFD volunteers are trained and prepared to handle emergencies that they may respond to and having them on our property allows us to maximize the training time of our members.

While our training facilities are in relatively good health, we have invested in required maintenance and upgrades over the last 18 months to make our volunteers safer and to continue to

be able to offer "live fire" training in our burn tower. Specifically, we have implemented a modernization project in our burn tower that features replacement tiling to protect the building from the temperature of a training fire, new temperature monitoring and alerting for safety, new stainless steel windows, and a revamped second floor layout which is modeled like a typical second floor of a home. In total, these improvements keep us in compliance with applicable NFPA safety standards, protect our buildings from the elements, and provide as realistic as possible environment for our members and neighboring agencies who use our facilities. With continuous training improvements like this your CFD volunteers will continue to be here when you need us!

A YOUNG BOY FOLLOWS HIS DREAM

Justin Clayton, a fourth grade student wrote a letter to the US Troops thanking them all for their service. Risking their lives every day and night to protect us and our country, and wished the troops a safe return home. Even back then Justin dreamed of being a United States Marine.

Justin was always interested in a way to somehow help people, maybe being a police officer. However in his heart all he wanted to be was a US Marine. During his senior year of High School in 2016, Justin wrote an essay on what he'd expect from becoming a police officer. As a result of his essay Justin was invited to spend some time with the Police Academy right here in Chili. Justin ultimately determined being a police officer would not fulfill his desire. During his senior year, Justin received a scholarship to Alfred University to play football where he excelled until an injury prevented him from continuing to play any longer. After losing that scholarship he decided to attend the State University of New York at Fredonia. Justin however, still had a calling to join the US Marines so in his second year at Fredonia he enlisted in the US Marine Corp.

In September 2018, Justin's first tour of duty was on Parris Island, SC to begin his rigorous training, three months later he moved to Camp Lejeune, NC "Home of Expeditionary Forces in Readiness" to further his training. After completing his training in Camp Lejeune, Justin was transferred to Fort Sill, OK for artillery training where he completed his training with a 98.7 GPA and was at the top of his class. Justin is currently stationed at Camp Pendleton for the next three years and his goal is to be a US Marine Military Police Officer.
