Mr. Layman said he objected to clause permanent residence. Mr. Handy termed Permanent residence a dangerous phrase.

Mr. Layman also objected to that sec that says trailer must be set back 70 ft. from Highway.

Mr. McCullen asked Mr. Gun White to state his views on Trailer Ordinance. Mr. White did not care to speak.

Mr. McCullen stated that a 70 ft. set back was a Violation of the Bill of rights and that the Board had no right to pass such an Ordinance.

Mr. Garver operator of the Air Port Trailer Park said he was willing to pay a fee for his trailer Park but that he would like some provision on trademark

Mr. Ponetta who operates a small Trailer Park on Southville Road said he did not object to a trailer Park license. He asked if his Hotel Toilet would be sufficient for his small Trailer Park.

A total of 53 persons were present many of them did not care to speak.

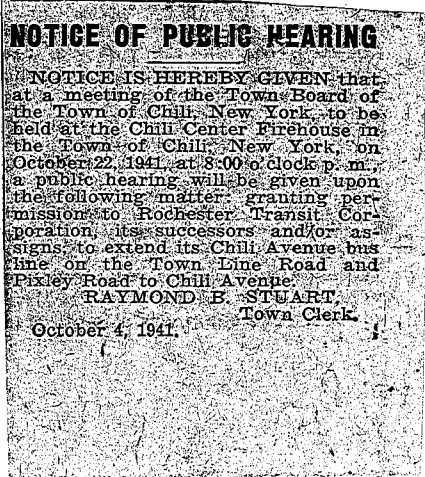

State Aid for Town Highways

My dear Supervisor:

As you know, Section 279 of the Highway Law provides for the payment annually by the State of certain moneys as state aid for town highways. These moneys are payable through the county, and the amount to be received by each town is determined as follows:

- (1) To each town which makes a tax levy of .00225 (two and twenty-five hundredths mills) or over on each dollar of actual valuation on taxable property in the Town, the State pays the difference between the amount raised by that tax and the sum of \$75.00 for each mile of highway maintained by the town outside cities and incorporated villages, provided that each town levying such a tax shall receive at least \$37.50 per such mile.
- (2) To each town where the highway tax levy was less than .00225 (two and twenty-five hundredths mills) but equalled \$37.50 per mile of such highways, the State pays the sum of \$37.50 per mile for each such mile of highway.
- (3) To all other towns, an amount equal to the sum so raised.

In the fall of 1940, when you adopted your highway program for the year 1941 and determined the amount to be raised by taxation for such purposes, you undoubtedly anticipated that your Town would receive in the fiscal year 1941 the full amount payable under the provisions of Section 279 of the Highway Law.

You now know that your Town has received only 84% of the amount to which it is clearly entitled under the Section of the Highway Law referred to. May we remind you of the circumstances which brought about this result. Under the State Constitution, the Governor is required to submit to the Legislature annually a proposed state budget. The Legislature can eliminate items therefrom or reduce appropriations, but it cannot add appropriations without the approval of the Governor.

The appropriations for state aid for town and county highways, as set forth in the proposed state budget submitted by the Governor to the Legislature last January, were insufficient to pay our towns and counties the amounts to which they are entitled under the Highway Law. Recognizing this fact, the Legislature added to the appropriations an additional \$1,564,000, but the Governor vetoed these additional appropriations.

As a result, the amount appropriated is insufficient, by 15½%, to pay our towns the full amount anticipated. The State Comptroller has treated each of the towns equally and paid them only 84½% of the amount to which they were entitled under Section 279 of the Highway Law.

The counties have suffered even more severely. If adequate appropriation had been made, they would have received in the aggregate approximately \$1,000,000 more than has been actually paid to them.

Immediately after the adjournment of the Legislature, the Association of Towns invited the Town and County Attorneys of the State to attend a conference at Syracuse, to consider what action, if any, should be taken to overcome the fiscal and other difficulties resulting from the reduced appropriations. About one hundred persons attended the conference. After considerable discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the matter be referred to a committee for investigation and recommendation. A Joint Committee, with representatives of the Association of Towns and the County Officers Association, was designated, with Chester J. Winslow, County Attorney of Herkimer County, as Chairman.

This Committee has completed its investigations and submitted its recommendations to the Association of Towns and the County Officers Association. The report may be summarized briefly, as follows:

- (a) The Committee believes there is reasonable possibility of compelling the State to pay the balance of highway aid moneys to each town and county.
- (b) The balance payable to a town or a county can be recovered only by prosecuting a claim in the Court of Claims.
- (c) A town or a county cannot recover such balance unless it has individually filed its claim within six months after the accrual of such claim.
- (d) The failure of the towns and counties to prosecute their claims for the balance of the moneys to which they are entitled as state aid for highways, may be construed by the Governor and the Legislature as an admission that we do not need the moneys and as a justification for further reductions in state aid for highways.

- (e) If the clear promise of the State to aid in financing the cost of town and county highways (as expressed in the Highway Law) can be evaded by the refusal of the Governor to concur in adequate appropriations, we may find state aid for schools and reimbursement for home relief similarly reduced in the near future.
- (f) While each town and county could prosecute separately and independently its claim for the balance of its state aid for highways, more effective results can be obtained, at materially reduced expense to our towns and counties, if all claims are prepared, presented, and prosecuted in the same manner and by the same representative.
- (g) Former Senator George R. Fearon, of the law firm of Costello, Cooney & Fearon, of Syracuse, is ideally equipped, by his ability and experience, to represent the towns and counties of the State in preparing, presenting, and prosecuting such claims.
- (h) After conference with the members of the Joint Committee, Senator Fearon agreed to handle the claim of each town upon the following basis:

Upon notifying him of his retainer, the town will forward to Mr. Fearon, the sum of \$10.00. This sum will cover all expenses of the town, including the necessary printing, mailing and traveling; also preparation, filing, and prosecution of the claim in the Court of Claims. If the claim is unsuccessful, there will be no further expense to the town, Mr. Fearon's fee being the balance left out of the \$10.00 after paying all necessary expenses. If the claim is upheld, Mr. Fearon is to be paid, in addition, five per cent (5%) of all moneys recovered by the town.

The recommendations of the Joint Committee on State Aid for Towns and County Highways were approved at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association of Towns, held in Albany on October 6th, 1941, and, as Executive Secretary, I was authorized and directed to advise you of such recommendations and to urge that your Town join with the other towns of the State, as well as the counties, in a joint effort to compel the State to make good on its state aid promise.

May I remind you that the claim of each town and county is a separate and distinct law suit. Unless your Town files a claim on time and in the proper form, it will derive no benefit from the successful prosecution of the claim of some other town or county. In the event that the towns filing claims are successful, it is altogether likely that the officers of the non-filing towns will be subjected to local criticism.

(Continued)

Under the terms upon which Mr. Fearon has agreed to handle the claims, the maximum expense to the town would be \$10.00, in the event that the claims are not upheld by the Court. If your Town desired to prosecute its claim by independent action, it would undoubtedly cost more than \$10.00 for actual expenses, to say nothing of the Attorney's fee. If the claim of your Town is upheld, Mr. Fearon would be entitled to additional compensation in the amount of five per cent (5%) of the moneys paid to your Town as a result thereof.

It is important that your Town promptly determine its course of action in this matter, because considerable time is required for the preparation, printing, and filing of each claim, and all claims must be filed in Albany before the middle of December (within six months from the date on which the county treasurer received the highway moneys from the State Comptroller).

If you should decide to cooperate with the other towns and the counties in the joint effort to compel payment by the State, the following procedure is urged upon you:

- (a) At a meeting of the Town Board, held not later than November 6th, 1941 (Thursday after election day), the Town Board of your Town should adopt a resolution in the form attached hereto.
- (b) Immediately after its adoption, forward a certified copy of the resolution, together with the sum of \$10.00, to Mr. George R. Fearon, 930 University Building, Syracuse, N. Y.
- (c) Advise him under which of the subdivisions (1, 2, or 3) of Section 279 of the Highway Law above quoted, your Town was entitled to state aid.

After the time for filing claims has expired, it is proposed that one test case will be selected and tried, so that it will not be necessary for the officers of more than one town to appear in Court as witnesses. When that case is decided, it should not be necessary to try any of the other cases instituted by the filing of claims, since they will be won or lost with the test case.
